Mission Statement

COPRODELI is an NGO which fights against poverty and social exclusion in Peru.

- We contribute to the comprehensive development of marginalized populations in urban areas and work to give these people more dignified lives, through access to education, health, employment and housing
- Our work benefits more than 100,000 people per year in Callao, Lima, Ica and San Martin, Peru. 60% of the people live in extreme poverty
- We focus on the reconstruction of homes and infrastructure damaged by the 2007 earthquake in Ica and, more recently, we are developing a presence in the Huallaga Valley in the Amazon Rainforest of San Martin

COPRODELI USA was founded in 1999, in Chicago, to provide constant financial and volunteer assistance to support Coprodeli's mission in Peru. Coprodeli Spain also contributes to this effort.

OUR HISTORY:

1989: Coprodeli is Founded



Spanish missionary Father Miguel Ranera founded Coprodeli in 1989, when he witnessed the extreme poverty people in his community live in and was inspired to help.

At this time, Callao, Peru, was suffering from food shortages, hyperinflation, terrorism, cholera outbreaks and misgovernment.

Under Father Miguel's leadership, women and youth, many of whom were inspired by their Christian faith, began to organize soup kitchens and distribute humanitarian aid in an effort to help those who were excluded from society.

OUR HISTORY:

1995: Flooding in Callao



In 1995, the Rímac River overflowed and flooded neighborhoods in Callao.

Coprodeli helped the community to rebuild its houses and infrastructure.

- soup kitchens were converted into shelters for the high-risk children living on the streets
- children began to receive support from sponsors abroad
- job creation programs and organized drug prevention programs which benefitted the displaced youth were created with aid from EU



Coprodeli put new energy and resources into its parish communities, creating a network of support throughout the city, and building schools as a way to develop the struggling communities. The schools benefitted more than 50,000 people every year, 95% of whom were living in extreme poverty.

OUR HISTORY: 2000-2006: Land Invasions in Pachacutec

Pachacutec was established in 2000 after more than 12,000 families were forcibly relocated there for political reasons. Abandoned on top of an immense sand dune in the desert without water, electricity, streets, schools, or employment, the government provided each family with only a mat and a bucket of water.

Shortly after, Coprodeli volunteers moved into the dunes and lived in the same harsh conditions. Within a month, they had established 3 community service centers with a school, health center and chapel.

With financial and volunteer support from the U.S. and Spain, Coprodeli was able to slowly modernize its centers and develop a large group of local volunteers.





80,000 homes and much of southern Peru's infrastructure were destroyed by a 7.9 magnitude earthquake which hit the Ica region in August 2007.

Following the quake, Coprodeli started a humanitarian aid program and sheltered homeless families in the area. Later, small centers were built to house at-risk youth mentoring programs, and Coprodeli constructed large centers, which include a school, clinic, library and parish. Most recently, Coprodeli has built more than 2,700 new earthquake resistant homes and has found ways to make them accessible to those most in need.

Today: A New Challenge

CIRCUMSTANCES HAVE BROUGHT US TO THE PERUVIAN JUNGLE

In 2012, San Martín community members donated land and gave control of an existing farming school to Coprodeli. Coprodeli is now constructing houses in 12 jungle towns and working on irrigation, highway and street projects.



PROGRAM SUCCESSES:

Education

Coprodeli's education program began in 1992 with the creation of 3 schools in Callao. By offering children living in poverty the chance to receive a high-quality education, we help to reduce social exclusion in Peru.


Copordeli signed an agreement with Peru's Ministry of Education to manage public schools in June 1994. The Coprodeli's extensive curriculum is more relevant to Peru's educational needs than that of the public school system.

Following the land invasions in Pachacutec, Coprodeli built 4 schools and outreach centers for high-risk youth in the newly formed community in 2000. After the 2007 earthquake, Coprodeli built 5 more schools to help those who had been affected in southern Peru.

In 2012, community members donated a farm school in Bellavista, San Martín. Since then, Coprodeli has began to support other schools in this jungle region as well.

Coprodeli was founded to serve the Peruvian neighborhoods and rural zones which were suffering from hunger, misery, terrorism, sharp class divides and social exclusion.

In Callao, Peru, Father Miguel and many volunteers started soup kitchens and provided social assistance to the poorest of the poor in two parishes.

In 1991, Coprodeli opened general medicine, obstetrics and dentistry clinics, and started a program to help at-risk mothers and their children.

In 2000, after thousands of people were relocated to Pachacutec, Coprodeli opened two medical centers there, complete with general medicine, obstetrics, dentistry, pharmaceutical and sonography services.

PROGRAM SUCCESSES: Health and Humanitarian Aid


In 2007, after the earthquake in Ica, Coprodeli opened 5 humanitarian aid shelters and 2 primary care medical centers in Chincha and Ica, Peru. While the buildings were under construction, Coprodeli completed 360 small medical campaigns to help those with immediate need. The medical centers now offer general medicine, obstetrics, dentistry, pharmaceutical and physical therapy services as well as a laboratory.

In 2013, Copordeli started a humanitarian aid campaign in San Martín, bringing clothing, shoes and other donations to families. Since then children across Peru receive TOMS shoes.


Over the years, Coprodeli Spain and USA have collected humanitarian aid donations to send to families in Peru.

PROGRAM SUCCESSES: At-Risk Youth



Our Children at High Risk Program began in 1994. Using funds from the EU, Coprodeli started this program to provide care and shelter to kids living on the street who were at risk of consuming drugs, delinquency and mistreatment as well as physical, psychological and sexual abuse.


Coprodeli opened two boarding schools and four outreach centers in order to safeguard these kids' rights, care for them and reduce exposure to negative influences.

In 1997 & 1998 Coprodeli used EU funds to develop preventative programs for at-risk youth, families, teachers and the community at-large which included psychological care, teacher training and social mediators for the kids.


Many of these children are supported by American or Spanish sponsors. Sponsorship provides the children with two nutritious meals per day, tutoring, care and counseling from a psychologist and access to a Coprodeli outreach center, which gives them a safe place to go before or after their half-day of school.

PROGRAM SUCCESSES:

Pastoral and Volunteer Opportunities

In order to attend to the population's spiritual needs, Coprodeli's founder Father Miguel encouraged many young people and women to dedicate themselves to the pastoral and humanitarian care of others. Building upon the Catholic roots of the Peruvian people, Coprodeli reinforces positive values of service, hope, love & peace.

PROGRAM SUCCESSES:

Job creation



The Job Creation program began in 1994 in order to provide job skills to unemployed workers and has since grown to include special classes in Coprodéli schools & 2 industrial parks.

Coprodéli established a technical school in collaboration with the local government in Callao. The school offered a variety of classes, including carpentry, computer, secretarial skills and sewing. Similar schools were opened in 2003 and 2008.

In 2009, Coprodéli started a job training program in its schools. Students have the option to choose an additional class to prepare them for their future career in a variety of professions and industries, including computer science, sewing, technical support, pharmacy assistant, graphic design, customs, cosmetology, nursing, electrician, baking and jewelry making. Thanks to agreements with various Peruvian government agencies, many of the students have the opportunity to do a three-month internship after completing their class.

Coprodéli also maintains industrial parks in Pachacutec and Ica. The parks bring together hundreds of small business owners who can work together to attract clients and produce and sell a variety of goods and services. Each park has a general manager who assesses small business plans and helps to market the owners' diverse selection of products.

PROGRAM SUCCESSES:

Habitat program

The Habitat program started as a way to solve housing and basic sanitation problems. In 1993, Coprodeli built a water well to help people in Callao, Peru. Some residents didn't have drinkable water, and the water they could obtain was expensive and oftentimes contaminated. After the floods in 1994, Coprodeli helped some affected families relocate out of the flooded zone.

Coprodeli also supported the new settlement in Pachacutec in 2000 by organizing the population and working with the Peruvian government to find solutions.

Following the 2007 earthquake in Ica, Peru, Coprodeli opened 5 temporary shelters and built a well that produces 70 liters of water per second.

Coprodeli participated in a program to restore Callao's historic city center, which is currently overcrowded by millions of struggling families.

In 2013, Coprodeli began a habitat project in the Huallaga Valley in Peru's northern jungle and plans to construct 400 houses per year to benefit 12 different Amazonian communities.

Urbanizations



After the 2007 earthquake in southern Peru, it was necessary to construct new urbanizations that included housing for displaced community members.

Since then, Coprodeli has constructed 1,100 lots and 471 houses which have sewers, roads and sidewalks, electricity and drinkable water. The houses are all built near schools and medical facilities.
